Q. LOOKING AT THE ENGINEERS WEEK SLOGAN - "ENGINEERS: PIONEERING AMERICA'S REVITALIZATION" - WHAT CAN ENGINEERS DO TO HELP AMERICA REVITALIZE?

A. Much of U.S. industry needs modernization in order to maintain or recapture leadership in technology and productivity from other nations. Savers and investors will have to provide the capital required for this job, but it is the Engineers who will be providing the brain-power and skills needed.

Q. HOW IS THE ENGINEERING FORCE AT MCB D HELPING IN THIS EFFORT?

A. MCB D is fortunate in having management farsighted enough to invest heavily in the capital equipment required to maintain leadership. Building on the capability of our modern factories, MCB D's engineers have done some very good work in designing products which are second to none in the world in quality, productivity, and cost-effectiveness. We must continue these efforts across all of our product lines.

Q. WILL THEY BE COPYING THE JAPANESE METHODS WE'VE HEARD SO MUCH ABOUT, OR DEVISING NEW TECHNIQUES?

A. We can always learn from others — both from their successes and their failures. Our engineers are encouraged to utilize unpatented knowledge developed elsewhere as well as to develop improved methods and techniques themselves. Of course, the Japanese are one of the sources

of knowledge in our field, but I expect that, in mobile radio, they are learning from us also. We have yet to see any Japanese radios which are the equal of our equivalent products.

Q. HOW BIG A PART IS NEW TECHNOLOGY, MICROPROCESSORS, ETC., PLAYING IN THE REVITALIZATION?

A. In my opinion, several of the new technologies are very important to the nation's future. The semiconductor and computer technologies are helping us multiply our brain-power just as, in the 19th century, the first powered machinery multiplied our muscle power. This will have a profoundly positive effect on our knowledge base and on our ability to solve some of our complex problems. The application of the inexpensive computer power to production machinery, plus advances in the machine mechanisms themselves, are changing the nature of our factories, making them more efficient, safer, and more interesting places in which to work. These factors will mean changes in the types of jobs available and

perhaps even changes in the nature of what work is and how it gets done.

Q. DO YOU FEEL THE U.S. GOVERNMENT WILL ASSIST IN THE REVITALIZATION WITH IMPORT TARIFFS, ETC.? OR, IS THAT JUST OVERLOOKING THE ORIGINAL PROBLEM?

A. I believe that import tariffs are not in our best long-term interest. Perhaps they would improve the position of the U.S. manufactured products in the domestic market, but they would not improve our basic industrial position nor our ability to compete in the world-wide marketplace. However, helpful governmental actions are possible. For example: The tax revisions of 1981 should help encourage saving and investment, thus providing more dollars for factory modernization. Simplification of governmental regulations and of the paper work which industry must fill out would minimize this non-productive activity within industry. However, a change in the overall relationship between government and industry would be the most helpful. Governmental-Industrial cooperation has been poor in the U.S. for many years. Improved cooperation is badly needed if U.S. industry is to regain its strength. Fighting world-wide competitors is a full-time effort. Our government must become our partner in the battle and not another combatant with which we must also do battle. The encouraging signs that the current Washington administration is seeking to reverse govern-



ment's traditional adversarial relationship with industry.
